The American Legion Launches Take Down Hep C Awareness Campaign

Dear American Legion Department Service Officers,

Hepatitis C (hep C) is one of the largest health concerns facing US military veterans today. It has been suggested by several studies that a higher prevalence of hep C is seen in veterans versus nonveterans:

- Over 5% of veterans enrolled in the care of the Veterans Health Administration have hep C, a blood borne virus, which causes inflammation of the liver that can lead to cirrhosis and liver cancer.
- Up to 75 percent of people with chronic hep C in the United States do not know they have it.

Most people living with the virus have no symptoms following infection.

Hep C is a blood-borne virus spread by contact with the blood of an infected individual. When left untreated, the virus can lead to cirrhosis and liver cancer. The good news is, the disease is curable — which means the hep C virus is not detectable in the blood months after treatment ends — but the key is testing.

Together we must help the veterans we serve to take charge of their health. The American Legion is working together with AbbVie, a National Corporate Alliance of The American Legion to launch the *Take Down Hep C* Campaign. This is a national movement that encourages people who are at risk to get tested for hep C antibodies.

Why are veterans at greater risk?

- Exposure to contaminated blood on the battlefield.
- Blood transfusions, blood product, or organ transplant (before 1992.
- Accidental needle stick injuries in health-care settings.

Sharing of personal items such as razors or toothbrushes.

As a Department Service Officer you have an important role to play in making this campaign a success. Abbvie will be providing The American Legion with hep C education and training materials. In addition, AbbVie's community health educators and nurse connectors will be reaching out to serve as resources. They would also like to work with you to provide your expertise to veterans they are assisting.

In the meantime, I encourage you to do the following:

Visit the campaign website www.Legion.org/TakeDownHepC to learn more about the campaign.

Find free or low-cost testing sites in your area and encourage veterans to get tested.

Finally, get tested yourself so that you can share your experience.

Let's join together to Take Down Hep C.
