We had a good turnout for bingo on March 29. Six riders helped.


Our next bingo day will be May 31. But of course there is bingo every Sunday starting at 2:00, and every Tuesday night beginning at 6:30, and could always use extra help.

Greetings,

As normal, our monthly drill started Friday evening, 10 Apr 2015. It was a typical one; berthing being set-up and study time. Saturday started with an 0600 reveille, PT, morning colors and chow followed by a very busy day with Supply Room and Storage Locker sorting and clean-up in the morning with afternoon classroom time covering Hazing. Fraternization. Harassment, drug & alcohol abuse prevention and promotion requirements and testing. After the evening chow, the cadets performed Evening Colors followed by structured time for school homework and working on their appropriate correspondence manuals.

Sunday started with an 0600 reveille, morning colors and chow. Classroom activities for the day covered the new Training and Operations Manual, Communications and Signal Flags. Additionally, the two berthing areas were cleaned and set-up for the 23 cadets we will be training starting 17 Apr 2015.

VA Eliminates Net Worth as Health Care Eligibility Factor

Elimination of Net Worth Makes More Veterans Eligible for Health Care

Washington – The Department of Veterans Affairs is updating the way it determines eligibility for VA health care, a change that will result in more Veterans having access to the health care benefits they've earned and deserve.

Effective 2015, VA eliminated the use of net worth as a determining factor for both health care programs and copayment responsibilities. This change makes VA health care benefits more accessible to lower-income Veterans and brings VA policies in line with Secretary Robert A.

McDonald's MyVA initiative which reorients VA around Veterans' needs.

"Everything that we do and every decision we make has to be focused on the Veterans we serve," said VA Secretary Robert A. McDonald. "We are working every day to earn their trust. Changing the way we determine eligibility to make the process easier for Veterans is part of our promise to our Veterans."

Instead of combining the sum of Veterans' income with their assets to determine eligibility for medical care and copayment obligations, VA will now only consider a Veteran's gross household income and deductible expenses from the previous year. Elimination of the consideration of net worth for VA health care enrollment means that certain lower-income, non-service-connected Veterans will have less out-of-pocket costs. Over a 5-year period, it is estimated that 190,000 Veterans will become eligible for reduced costs of their health care services.

In March 2014, VA eliminated the annual requirement for updated financial information.

Members can check the Post Bulletin Board and Web site for more information VA now uses information from the Internal Revenue Service and Social Security Administration to automatically match individual Veterans' income information which reduces the burden on Veterans to keep their healthcare eligibility up to date. That change better aligned VA's health care financial assessment program with other federal health care organizations.

Veterans may submit updated income information at www.1010ez.med.va.gov/, or by visiting their nearby VA health care facility.

CAMP LEJEUNE: PAST WATER CONTAMINATION & HEALTH BENEFITS

From the 1950s through the 1980s, people living or working at the U.S. Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, were potentially exposed to drinking water contaminated with industrial solvents, benzene, and other chemicals. This chemical exposure may have led to health conditions.

IF YOU HAVE BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH ONE OF THESE 15 QUALIFYING HEALTH CONDITIONS:

Esophageal cancer • Female infertility • Leukemia •
 Breast cancer • Scleroderma • Myelodysplastic syndromes • Kidney cancer • Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma • Hepatic steatosis • Multiple myeloma • Lung cancer • Miscarriage • Renal toxicity • Bladder cancer • Neurobehavioral effects

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR VA HEALTH BENE-FITS IF YOU:

Served on active duty (Veterans) or resided (Family Members) at Camp Lejeune for 30 days or more between August 1, 1953 and December 31, 1987.

IF ELIGIBLE:

Veterans receive VA health care; care for qualifying health conditions is at no cost (including copayments)

Family members receive reimbursement for out-ofpocket medical expenses incurred from treatment of qualifying health conditions
