





Greetings,

The unit's drill weekend for September was unique. We spent the weekend at the US Navy SERE facility near Rangeley.

Upon arrival, the cadets met with the Navy SERE instructors; were given a short orientation, a safety briefing and issued some necessary items. They were then escorted to the camping area where they were shown where to set up for the night. It was a cold night with a temperature of 30degrees at the 0600 reveille. The campfire was already ablaze and water on to boil.

No time was wasted as instruction began in earnest. Firebuilding skills were demonstrated by the instructors, hot oatmeal was

skills and topographical map usage. After classroom instruction, the cadets were challenged to take a given heading and distance and get from point A to point B through the dense forest. Once they reached point B, they had to find where they were located on the map using bi-angulations and tri-angulations. During the return trip, they were challenged to build a fire in a still damp environment from the previous evening's rain. Then back to base camp and the evening meal.

The cadets built a campfire and

From the jump-off point, the cadets hiked uphill through dense forest for just over 500 meters. At that point we came upon a stream with natural water slides into pools of water about 3 feet deep. Cadets were allowed to change out of uniforms into spare clothing and then took turns down one of the slides into 45 degree water. The lesson of immediate cold and limited physical abilities became obvious. They served and cadets were instructed on wood gathering and then had to build their own fires using only flint and steel. Success was attained by all of them and this would be demonstrated numerous times on Saturday & Sunday.

The next event was how to build shelter. Class time was held in the forest discussing and demonstrating the use of the military issued rain poncho to build a waterproof shelter as well as other techniques. The cadets then had to construct their own individual shelter using any of the items they had in their possession and found in the forest environment. The first test came when the instructors had to look for two of the well camouflaged shelters. The second test came with

the remaining two rabbits and some vegetables were prepared to make a stew. Once the stew was set upon the campfire, the rabbits buried earlier were dug up and shared amongst the entire group. The stew was done in about an hour and that finished the evening meal. After cleanup, more classroom time filled most of the evening. The campfire was relit, cadets were instructed to procure long thin green sticks and marshmallows were roasted until taps at 2200.

then had to build a fire for warmth and then were allowed to change into warm, dry uniforms. The final event was the 500-meter hike back to the bus. The SERE Instructors were thanked for their efforts and were given a farewell wave for providing the great experience and education.

I, on behalf of the entire battalion, wish to thank the local communities, the entire Legion membership, cadet's families and friends the heavy rain on Saturday night. Everyone stayed warm and dry!

The day's next event was how to build snares and traps using wire and "550" cord and how to process and use captured game. In this case, it was rabbits. Four were processed and preparations for cooking were discussed including digging a pit-oven for baking the rabbits. The pit was dug and two rabbits were put into it for baking for the evening meal per the instructor's directions and two left for later to make a stew. Lunch consisted of lessons on how to properly prepare and eat MREs

Once lunch was completed, they moved onto land navigation

Sunday started with a 0600 reveille. The cadets built the base camp fire in preparation for a breakfast of hot dogs roasted over the campfire. Once breakfast was completed, the cadets were informed that the last event was to be cold-water immersion training to demonstrate the immediate effects on the human body. But first, clean-up. Once all of the areas used were left spotless with no trace of humans, we boarded the bus and headed to the jump-off point for the last
